## 6. **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHTS**

a. Intensive Case Management Team

Sanjeev Nand, Executive Director, Laura Kendell, Manager of Substance Use Services, Langley Community Services Society and Fraser Holland, Manager of Program Services, Stepping Stone Community Services were in attendance.

Mr. Nand provided an overview of the Intensive Case Management Team (ICM) which is a team-based model of care, funded by the Fraser Health Authority, serving individuals 19 years or older with moderate to severe substance use problems with or without mental illness, concurrent disorders or with co-existing functional impairment.

The representatives responded to questions from Council regarding:

- The difference between ACT and ICM teams;
- The status of BC Housing's conversion of the Quality Inn into housing for the homeless;
- How the team intends to deal with referrals;
- Whether Langley Memorial Hospital will have a role in provision of services;
- Whether ICM is up and running at the present time;
- Whether ICM has a role in addressing overdoses in residential homes.

b. Metro Vancouver - Councillor Storteboom

Councillor Storteboom expressed thanks to Mayor Schaffer and all of Langley City Council for attending Saturday's Council of Councils Meeting with Metro Vancouver in North Vancouver. He advised that Metro Vancouver regularly hosts these information meetings to provide representatives and elected officials from local governments throughout the Metro Vancouver region with regular and up-to-date information on current issues impacting our region, and to encourage a frank exchange of conversation about these issues.

He further advised that, as directed, City staff prepared and distributed a letter of concern from our Mayor and City Council about proposed, significant increases in development cost charges. The new development charges are intended to provide for the expense of ongoing growth in our region, particularly in the South of Fraser area. DCC rates haven't been updated in 20 years.

The next Metro Vancouver Board of Directors Meeting is scheduled for Friday, October 27<sup>th</sup> and the next Climate Action Committee Meeting will be Wednesday, November 1st.

### c. Library Happenings - Councillor Martin

Councillor Martin advised that Kimberley Constable has now returned to work as the Library Manager. Library staff deeply appreciated all of Jo-Ann Sleiman's hard work as the Acting Library Manager. They are now helping Kimberley get up to speed on everything new and exciting at the Langley City Library.

### 1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Schaffer called the Public Hearing to order.

Mayor Schaffer read a statement regarding the procedure to be followed for the Public Hearing.

The Corporate Officer advised that notification of the Public Hearing had been publicized in the following manner:

Notice was placed on the City Hall notice board on Tuesday, October 3<sup>rd</sup>. Notices were mailed and hand delivered to properties within 100 metres of the subject properties and a newspaper advertisement was placed in the October 12<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> issues of the Langley Advance. One piece of correspondence had been received and had been circulated to Council on-table.

## 2. <u>BUSINESS</u>

a. Bylaw 3027 - Zoning Amendment

To amend the Zoning Bylaw, 1996, No. 2100 to rezone the property located at 19753 55A Avenue from RS1 – Single Family Residential Zone to CD-49 Comprehensive Development Zone to accommodate a 14-unit townhouse development.

The Mayor invited Fred Adab, F. Adab Architects to speak to the proposed bylaw and development permit.

Mr. Adab provided information on the proposed development as follows:

- context photos of site with surrounding developments;
- site plan;
- project statistics, in particular that this phase has two car garages, 4 bedroom units;
- streetscape renderings;
- form and character of the building;
- exterior finishes:
- sustainability and green measures;
- crime prevention through environmental design.

Ruchir Dahl, Principal at Bent Picture Creative Ventures Landscape Architects advised that the principles of design are almost exactly the same as Phase 1 of the project;

Darren Sahota, property owner, read out a letter from his lawyer requesting that the City allow the property owner to submit their development permit application for approval pending eviction of the tenants currently occupying the property.

The Mayor invited those in attendance who deem their interest in property affected by the proposed bylaw and development permit to present their comments.

Janette Giffin, 21, 19741 55A Ave., referred to her correspondence submitted to Council advising that:

- she had purchased her trailer back in 1998 as it had a large yard for her dogs;
- she understands that the City is trying to increase the number of homes in the area; however, the trailer park homes were affordable housing;
- she doesn't see how she will be able to find a comparable replacement as her current home has such a large yard for a trailer pad;
- in reference to the policies included in her submission from the City of Surrey and Township of Langley as to their policies for redevelopment

- of mobile home parks, that the City consider implementing similar policies for the remaining two homes at the site;
- she doesn't know how she will be able to afford to go anywhere else as her trailer is too old to be moved and, if she had to move farther out into the Fraser Valley to find affordable housing, she would also need to find another job;
- Council consider what her housing options would be to allow her to remain within the vicinity of her current home.

The Mayor called for further representations from those in attendance on the proposed bylaw and development permit. There were no further speakers.

Council provided the following comments and questions:

- Sections of the policies of the other municipalities submitted in Ms.
  Giffin's correspondence state that if there is to be redevelopment of a
  manufactured home park the developer has to offer some
  compensatory payment to the owners being evicted. Has Ms. Giffin
  been offered such compensation, to which Ms. Giffin advised that she
  was offered \$5,000 to leave early;
- If this development proposal is approved tonight Ms. Giffin has a year to find other accommodation;
- Whether Ms. Giffin has tried to negotiate better compensation from the developer, to which Ms. Giffin advised that she has not.
- Whether staff is aware how these voluntary compensation programs work in other municipalities, to which staff replied they are wide ranging in scope and nature;
- Whether this area is designated for higher density under the OCP, to which staff replied that yes, it is designated medium density residential.

Dave Lede House (DLH) is Canuck Place's second provincial location, providing pediatric palliative care in the Fraser Valley where 44% of Canuck Place children and families reside.

# Community and Outpatient Services at Canuck Place - Dave Lede House (DLH)

- Canuck Place advanced practice nurses and specialized physicians provide outpatient clinical care through mobile clinical consultations with families in-home, in-hospital and community.
- Our recreation therapy program operates from DLH for children, their siblings and parents.
- Our counsellors provide counselling, play and art therapy and have recurring sibling, parent groups and a pilot grandparent bereavement group, to support families through life-altering loss.
- Through programs offered by Canuck Place music therapists, children and teens are able to express emotions, connect with others, communicate nonverbally and manage distressing symptoms. Individual, group and family sessions take place in DLH.

# Building Capacity - Inpatient Beds at Canuck Place - Dave Lede House Opening May 2018

We have more children and more families on our program each year. And we are building capacity so that we can accommodate our patients and families.

In May 2018 Canuck Place will open inpatient beds at Dave Lede House in the Fraser Valley community where 44% of the children and families on program live.

The phase-in operation of 24-hour care beds at DLH requires careful planning, training, program development and processes and systems integration. Hiring and training for clinical staff will occur January 2018 to April 2018.

# More children and families need our help. You can help change their lives.

Canuck Place Children's Hospice inpatient care is highly cost effective - about 30% less when compared to a pediatric BC hospital ward or ICU bed.

By 2020, 50% of the children in BC will live in the Fraser Valley and we want to ensure we meet the growing demand for care.

Canuck Place raises 60% of the funds needed to operate annually. Our team relies on a caring community of donors to maintain services, and the need continues to grow.

#### Canuck Place eases the burden on families.

When a child is diagnosed with a life-threatening illness, parents are impacted by the 24-hour care they provide for their child. The very real stresses incurred by these families include financial pressures, relationship challenges, fatigue, distress and increasing acute-care needs which impact mental and physical health and the overall quality of life for BC families.

# Building capacity to meet the needs of children and families

In 2016-17 Canuck Place provided care for 715 children and families - a 6% increase over the previous year.

- 6 average number of children inpatient care per 24 hours in 2016-17
- 396 admissions for inpatient care in 2016-17
- 632 calls to the nurse helpline from families across BC in 2016-17

Lumina was born with severe Hydrocephalus, a genetic disorder that affects the development of muscles, brain, and eyes. She requires 24-hour care, a feeding tube, and has frequent seizures. Not only does Lumina receive medical respite and symptom management but her family is supported with care and counselling so they can focus on savouring their time together.

"Canuck Place is so wonderful," said Dwayne, Lumina's father. "They provide expert care, love and support for families, and children like our Lumina, who desperately need such assistance."



Guide people through your space and limit opportunities for undesired access.

- Make clear and definitive entrances and exits.
- Employ fences, landscaping, and other physical barriers to guide exterior movement.
- Consider employing interior obstacles, like maze entrances, to cut off straight-line access to potential targets, such as the cashier.
- Use curbing and bollards to direct automobile and foot traffic into a controlled visible area.
- Use lights, security devices and tamperresistant materials to make your property less of a target.



Put a clear line of distinction between your private property and public property. This gives legitimate occupants a sense of ownership and a willingness to defend their property while putting intruders on the defensive.

- Employ unique facades, projected awnings, different coloured entrances, patios, and flower boxes to delineate your space.
- Install short walls or plant gardens to discourage trespassing.
- Make security signage clearly visible at all entrances.
- · Consider escorting visitors or provide badges.



CRIME PREVENTION STRATEGIES

Reduce crime, prevent losses, and create safer environments with these *Crime Prevention*Through Environmental Design (CPTED) strategies. It's good for the community and it's good for business.

Maximize the ability to spot suspicious people and activities from inside and outside a business.

- Place the Point of Sale location where it is visible throughout the store and from the public realm outside the store.
- Ensure that window displays, signage, and other obstacles do not obscure sight lines.
- Trim landscaping below ground level windows and keep trees pruned above eye level.
- Add lighting to enhance visibility, but avoid directing the lighting so that it glares into the eyes of the cashier or passersby.



A well maintained area communicates that people care and are monitoring the area, deterring vandalism and other crimes.

- Ensure that the building and area is clean and free of clutter, such as outdoor storage items, which may give an impression of abandoned property.
- Remove graffiti promptly. Consider getting mural artwork to deter future graffiti.
- Paint and repair exteriors. The "Broken Window Theory" conveys that one broken window will entice vandals to break another, thereby inviting higher levels of crime.

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
