3. **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHTS**

a. Langley Field Naturalists

Lilianne Fuller, Member, Langley Field Naturalists provided information about current activities:

- as this year is the 50th anniversary of the Langley Field Naturalists, they have completed a book and will be publishing it using the grant received from the City; they hope to launch the book in September 2023;
- thanked the City for its financial support;
- from grants received from the City over the years, they have been able to publish three brochures:
 - Birds in Langley, which is in its 4th printing, and is available in City recreation centres and the Library;
 - Butterflies in Langley;
 - Experience Nature (membership brochure);
- each of the brochures displays the City of Langley logo to acknowledge the financial support received from the City;
- the Experience Nature brochure is made of paper to be more environmentally friendly, whereas the other two are meant to be used as field guides.
- Lisa Dreves is the President of Langley Field Naturalists; Ms. Fuller is their Public Relations Director;
- the organization conducts nature walks throughout the community, particularly in Bryden Lagoon, as they were instrumental in making it into a jewel of the city;
- the organization's motto is To Know Nature and to Keep it Worth Knowing;
- the organization does a lot of work in conservation;
- they are pleased to note that the City is very environmentally conscious and they appreciate the City's efforts;
- welcomed the new Council members, and thanked them for their support;
- advised that the Langley Field Naturalists will be hosting the Federation of BC Naturalists AGM Conference April 4-6.

b. Council Advisory Bodies Update

Councillor Wallace, Chair of the Fraser Valley Library Board, advised of two new items that have been added to the Library's "Playground" lending collection: thermal leak detectors and radon detectors.

Councillor Albrecht, Council Representative on the Metro Vancouver Board, advised that the Board went through a strategic planning session recently, the results of which will be compiled into a report that will likely be provided to the Board at the end of April or early May; some of the topics discussed included the future of the region, finances, and infrastructure.

He further advised that he is currently First Vice-President on the Lower Mainland Local Government Association (LMLGA), and the LMLGA Conference is coming up in May, which he believes all Council members will be attending.

Mayor Pachal advised that the province announced they were granting \$479 million to TransLink to maintain the service in good order over the next several years. The Mayors' Council, through the Board, have signed off on the agreement, which means service levels will be maintained at, or above current levels as outlined in the 2023 investment plan. This allows the Mayors' Council to move forward with the 2024/2025 investment plan and also extends the "under 12 for free" program which allows children under 12 to ride transit for free.

He further advised that TransLink recently launched their development arm, the purpose of which is to allow TransLink to build residential or commercial rental developments on lands they own for which they don't need to provide transit service or which are on top of transit infrastructure and use a portion of the profits to help fund transit. Mayor Pachal noted that this could mean development opportunities on top of SkyTrain stations or adjacent to bus loops. He noted that this region, unlike some other Canadian regions, is fortunate not to have to implement any transit cuts.
