a. Langley Human Dignity Coalition

4. **COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHTS**

a. Summer Youth Employment Project - Langley Environmental Partners Society (LEPS)

Carly Stromsten, Coordinator, LEPS, provided information on activities of Summer Youth Employment Project 2018, providing information on:

- Project goals
- Project measurables
- Habitat enhancement projects

Ms. Stromsten responded to questions from Council advising that:

- a pollinator pit stop was created at Buckley Park by planting native flowering perennials within a 1700 m sq. area to attract more pollinators to the area;
- it takes about five years of repeated culling to fully eradicate blackberries in a given area; it takes about two years to eradicate Lamium and Ivy; LEPS intends to return year after year to the same areas they have been working on to remove invasive plants in order to fully eradicate them over time.

5. MAYOR'S REPORT

a. Metro Vancouver Update - Councillor Storteboom

At last weeks Metro Vancouver Climate Action Committee Meeting we adopted the final details for the Climate 2050 Strategic Framework for consideration at our next Board of Directors Meeting. The Climate 2050 Strategic Framework will be used like a lens to view Metro Vancouver policies and practices in order to help us be more conscientious about how we may impact our environment.

Also, Metro Vancouver and the Invasive Species Council have partnered together to create a set of best management practices for specific invasive species that can be found in our region. As you know, invasive species are plants and animals that have been introduced to an area without the natural predators and pathogens from their native habitats, that would help keep them in check. Invasive species can threaten properties, infrastructure, agriculture, public health and safety as well as the natural diversity of our environment. The most recent report has added best management practices for the control of Himalayan blackberry, Scotch broom and European chaferbeetle to the list that includes knotweed, giant hogweed and the European fire ant.
